

With no shortage of ideas for articles, and steadily rising momentum Holly is excited about the great community initiatives she's planning for this year and the great community around her. Nevertheless, to everyone's delight, the responses have consistently been "yes, I would love to." Equally impressive are how gracious and well prepared people have been, she says, "It changes how you feel about the people around you."
